






# Over half of the Hispanic population was foreign-born; the majority immigrated in the past 20 years






### Nearly one-half of all Hispanics resided in Toronto or Montreal






#### A higher proportion of the Hispanic population are in the younger age groups






## Slightly higher proportions with university degrees, but also those with less than high school






Labour force characteristics of Hispanic men close to that of the total population; slightly larger gaps among the women




Over one-quarter of Hispanic women had sales and service occupations, while trades, transport and equipment operators was most common for men





## Earlier Hispanic immigrants have higher average incomes than more recent arrivals





### Conclusion – the key findings

- Geographically dispersed, but nearly half reside in Canada's two largest urban areas
- Large proportion of foreign-born, with many arriving in the 1990s
- Younger age profile than the general population
- Higher proportion of university education
- Labour force characteristics similar to the general population for men, while for women there are some gaps
- Immigrant men had higher employment and participation rates than other immigrant men
- Average income increases with more years spent in Canada
